

We hope it will be a time that our tamariki will remember for the whanaukataka as well as the fun. Thanks to kaiwhakahaere, Aroha, and all those who worked together to provide this special time for our tamariki.


It is proving to be such a success with having the carvers working at the Rūnaka office grounds that we are really pleased to be able to provide a room for our weavers to use. The oldest ex-classroom on the old school site had been rented to the Karitane Lodge but they have relinquished their lease as the lodge has closed due to dwindling numbers. This is an opportunity for us to give the room a long overdue facelift and create a welcoming space for our weavers.

At the end of May a small roopu will be travelling to Healesville, in the Yarra Ranges outside of Melbourne. This visit is to renew our links with the Wurundjeri and other Aboriginal communities of the Yarra area. Last year we started a joint project with those communities in establishing a garden and this time we will participate in a community planting day as well as gathering korero for a sculpture for the garden. On our first trip we learnt that kakahu made from possum skins are taoka to Wurundjeri and that they take them out on loan from museums to wear for ceremonial occasions. Because possums are protected in Australia it is difficult to source skins to make new cloaks so we hope to take a special koha of possum skins, at least 30, to our hosts.

The date for the whakamoemiti for the marae adornments and hapū celebration weekend has moved to 10th & 11th November. This is still a tentative date but will be confirmed (or new date set) at the 6 May Rūnaka General meeting. Better pencil it on the calendar & start checking out cheap fares.

Well done to all who wielded shovels and spades etc at the Otakou DIY Marae. Congratulations on what was achieved – we'll be able to view the results when the programme is screened on Maori Television.

Puketeraki Marae Adornment Project

For those that have been following the progress of this project, you will know by now that the carvings for the outside of the wharenui are well underway.

This mahi has been helped along with the extra hands of a number of locals, some who have stopped in for a day or two, and a couple who have now given up most of their days to support the work. These two, Malcolm Murchie and Alex Whitaker, started in January, and along with Te Kore Chisholm have now brought the number of people in the workshop up to six.

The carvers all went on a hikoi with Huata Holmes in the last week of February to go to some of our significant historical sites and hear the stories associated with them. This was to help link the artworks to the land and the people, and to inspire with the creation of new works.

Harvesting of Riwai and Wharerau wanaka

This day was held on the 17th of March and involved digging and sorting of Riwai, waiata and korero from Bill Dacker about wharerau, or roundhouses that were used for temporary and seasonal shelters.

Bill had already gathered some of the materials, and we started to have a go at constructing the first bits of a waharoa up on Mt Cargill. Bill gave us an idea of how they were constructed, and some of the history behind them.

Everyone was very inspired to try and make one for the school or the marae, and Bill said we could make a living waharoa, using trees such as Houhere, or Ribbonwood, and Brendon suggested that it could go on Huriawa. This might be a good project for a future workshop.

Special thanks to kaumatua Harold Ashwell (90 years) and his whanau for making the journey from Bluff for the wanaka.

We especially loved his koha of five (5) copies of his book "Tutakiwa: Place names of Rakiura, Ruapuke and Awarua. Two of these books will be prizes at the next Runaka General Meeting.

Plunket Centenary

Customary Fisheries Training


