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Kati Huirapa Rünanga ki Puketeraki Marae Development Project

Over the last two years, the rūnaka has had a continuing körero around appropriate decorations, adornments or artistic embellishments for the marae. Included in that körero is our wharenui Huirapa, the adjoining wharekai, Marirehau, and the marae grounds, encompassing the marae atea and pathway.

There have been a number of activities and wänanga to assist us in this important decision-making process:

2003

- A "brainstorming" wänaka, facilitated by Paul White and Dean Fraser, to come up with ideas and our vision for the marae.
- A heke to Murihiku to look and learn about carvings and art of interest to us, in particular Awarua marae with its special wharenui and wharekai, as well as the contrasting style of Murihiku Marae.

2004

- a whakapapa wänaka led by our kaumatua Mahana Walsh and Huata Holmes
- A story-gathering afternoon with kaumatua, poua & taua. Oral histories that were shared were all stories of growing up at Puketeraki and Karitane and were about the people of this area.
- Two successful Hui to discover more about Mäori design and our own creativity through the art of kowhaiwhai. These have been guided by Simon Kaan, Sandra Kellian and Phyllis Smith, with impetus given by whänau from Awarua marae, who came through to share their skills and experience at the first Hui.
- A "Beach Day" with whänau encouraged to explore their own ideas by creating sand sculptures.

2005

 A four-day heke to Bruce Bay for the opening of Te Tauraka Waka a Maui marae, that also took us along our traditional mahika kai areas. This was led by Matapura Ellison and Brian Allingham, who gave us insight into where our tupuna travelled and how they lived from the whenua.

All of these activities and wanaka have been undertaken to:

- assist whänau in thinking about the refurbishment and decoration of the marae and include as many of the whänau as possible in the process so as to hear all voices;
- co-ordinate projects;
- position Huirapa rūnaka as an innovative and creative hapü with a local and national profile; and
- Outline a clear structure for achieving this in order to complete the project within a clear and measurable time-frame.

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Our two year journey has now moved into the next phase – it is time for the whänau to come back together, with their knowledge, experience and views, to meet with our artists and organizers so that together, we can begin an actual project during the forthcoming year. In order to do this we need to consider:

- what stories we want depicted;
- what art forms we would like to see; and
- How our artists and rünaka members can work together.

We will begin this dialogue at the **Runaka General Meeting on March 13**. You are encouraged to come along to the meeting to share your vision, thoughts or ideas for the marae and how the process might best work. However, if you can't be at the meeting, please send, phone or email your ideas to the rünaka office so that your ideas can be shared.

We look forward to seeing you then.
