Suzanne Ellison MNZM

On May 16th, 2018, the Ellison whānau of Karitane embarked on a hikoī to Wellington to celebrate Suzanne Ellison's investiture at Government House where she became a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit.

Suzanne's award was announced in the New Year's Honours list 2017 and was bestowed for her life-long services to Māori, the arts, and governance. This particular ceremony was of extra special significance because Suzanne was one of sixteen female recipients recognised on this day to mark 125 years of Women's Suffrage.

Six of our whānau, two of whom had travelled from Australia, were lucky enough to be invited guests of Dame Patsy Reddy, Governor General of New Zealand.

Dame Patsy congratulated Suzanne for her dedication and commitment to various causes, particularly her work for Ngāi Tahu, and her work for Te Waka Toi (the Māori Arts Council) and Creative NZ but the commendation included a long, long list of other mahi in the arts and governance during her distinguished career.

Afterwards, the Governor General took the time to meet each of us, chatting and posing for photographs during the informal afternoon tea. We were then free to wander the public spaces of Government House, mingling with other recipients and their families.

It was a great honour to have been a part of Suzanne's special day and needless to say we are all very proud of her achievements. Truly a well-deserved award.

Exciting update for the Te Reo Rakatahi i Otago LEOTC Programme

E te whānau, nāia te mihi o te Tau Hou ki a koutou! It is my great pleasure to introduce myself in my new capacity as the new facilitator for our Learning Experiences Outside the Classroom (LEOTC) programme, Te Reo Rakatahi i Otago.

The LEOTC programme has been running for almost 15 years and provides opportunities for schools in the Otago region to experience te reo Māori me ōhona tikaka in our takiwā at the marae and beyond, including hands-on practical activities such as waiata ā-rika, mau rākau, raranga, poi, pūrākau and local history. Kāti Huirapa ki Puketeraki holds the contract to deliver the LEOTC programme until December 2019.

Over the next few months I will be working with our fabulous and dedicated team of tutors and connecting with other LEOTC providers (such as Orokonui Ecosanctuary, Otago Museum, Toitū and the Dunedin Public Art Gallery) to further develop kaupapa- and wānaka-based programmes in our rohe.

On Sunday 19 August I visited the Te Whānau Arohanui in Waitati near Dunedin, where members of Whiria ka Aho ki Puketeraki roopu were learning the mahi of making various articles used by our Tipuna before colonisation. They were led by a very experienced Kaiako, Lisa Phillips. You will see in the photo some of the work they accomplished on this the second wānaka but another 2 weekend wānaka are to come.

A list of the treasures I saw on the day were:

- Waka kura [pepe pod]
- Wakawairua, [coffin]
- Epu whenua [afterbirth]
- Waka koiwi [ashes]

I was also very privileged to be shown around Lisa's workshop where she makes her flax paper, the finest I have ever seen. She will use the paper to line the woven containers.

The next two wānaka will be to make waka wairua. The task will be great! The preparation of the harakeke before they even arrive to do the weave is significant they are very dedicated and have increased their skills this year so much, continuing to add to their skill base there will be another wānaka later in the year learning to make kete whakairo they will be staying on our marae for those wānaka.

Labour weekend we will be teaching how to make muka in the weave room. All welcome, we meet about 10 am have a shared lunch then finish up about 3pm.

HUI TE RANGIORA - MAINTAINING THE LINKS

The first entry in the Baptismal Register was made on January 10th 1904 when Katarina Ruru Te Wahia was baptised. Her parents were Tamati & Hera Te Wahia. The third entry is Teone Rangiroa, my father, who was baptised on 1 January 1905. He was born 15 May 1901 so there was a delay in being baptised for some now unknown reason. His sponsors were Ani Parata, Clive Evans and William Parata.

My entry is No. 161 on 22nd September 1957. My nieces Aroha (No. 202) and Melissa (No. 203) were both baptised on 20 February 1977 and the photo below was taken following the baptism on 24th April 2011 of my great-niece Hana Nikuru (No. 259). Her sister Maearoa was baptised Easter Day 16th April 2006.
